(Sacraments of Christian Initiation: Baptism, The Eucharist, Confirmation)

1. Baptism

- Water Baptism _____ (Initial Justification See Section 1)
 - **CCC 405** Baptism, by imparting the life of Christ's grace, erases original sin and turns a man back toward God, but the consequences for nature, weakened and inclined to evil, persist in man and summon him to spiritual battle.
 - CCC 1213 Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in
 the Spirit (vitae spiritualis ianua), and the door which gives access to the other
 sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we
 become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her
 mission: "Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration through water and in the word."

Read CCC 1234-1245

- **CCC 1237** Since Baptism signifies liberation from sin and from its instigator the devil, one or more *exorcisms* are pronounced over the candidate. The celebrant then anoints him with the oil of catechumens, or lays his hands on him, and he explicitly renounces Satan. Thus prepared, he is able to *confess the faith of the Church*, to which he will be "entrusted" by Baptism. (1673; 189)
- CCC 1239 The essential rite of the sacrament follows: Baptism properly speaking. It signifies and actually brings about death to sin and entry into the life of the Most Holy Trinity through configuration to the Paschal mystery of Christ. Baptism is performed in the most expressive way by triple immersion in the baptismal water. However, from ancient times it has also been able to be conferred by pouring the water three times over the candidate's head. (1214)
- **CCC 1243** The newly baptized is now, in the only Son, a child of God entitled to say the prayer of the children of God: "Our Father."
- **CCC 1244** *First Holy Communion*. Having become a child of God clothed with the wedding garment, the neophyte is admitted "to the marriage supper of the Lamb" and receives the food of the new life, the body and blood of Christ.
- CCC 1257 The Lord himself affirms that Baptism is necessary for salvation

- **CCC 1127** Celebrated worthily in faith, the sacraments confer the grace that they signify. They are *efficacious* because in them Christ himself is at work:
- CCC 1393 Holy Communion separates us from sin. The body of Christ we receive in Holy Communion is "given up for us," and the blood we drink "shed for the many for the forgiveness of sins." For this reason the Eucharist cannot unite us to Christ without at the same time cleansing us from past sins and preserving us from future sins: (613)
- **CCC 1128** This is the meaning of the Church's affirmation that the sacraments act *ex opere operato* (literally: "by the very fact of the action's being performed"), i.e., by virtue of the saving work of Christ, accomplished once for all. It follows that "the sacrament is not wrought by the righteousness of either the celebrant or the recipient, but by the power of God
- **CCC 1129** The Church affirms that for believers the sacraments of the New Covenant are *necessary for salvation*
- **CCC 1366** The Eucharist is thus a sacrifice because it *re-presents* (makes present) the sacrifice of the cross, because it is its *memorial* and because it *applies* its fruit
 - By partaking in The Eucharist, Christ's sacrifice is _____ to the individual
- **CCC 1367** The sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are *one single sacrifice*: "The victim is one and the same: the same now offers through the ministry of priests, who then offered himself on the cross; only the manner of offering is different." "And since in this divine sacrifice which is celebrated in the Mass, the same Christ who offered himself once in a bloody manner on the altar of the cross is contained and offered in an unbloody manner ... this sacrifice is truly propitiatory."
- CCC 1325 "The Eucharist is the efficacious sign and sublime cause of that
 communion in the divine life and that unity of the People of God by which the Church is
 kept in being. It is the culmination both of God's action sanctifying the world in Christ
 and of the worship men offer to Christ and through him to the Father in the Holy Spirit."
 (775)
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 891, p.271 If anyone denies that all and each of the faithful of Christ of both sexes, when they have reached the years of discretion, are bound every year to communicate at least at Easter according to the precept of holy mother Church: let him be anathema.

- CCC 1333 At the heart of the Eucharistic celebration are the bread and wine that, by the words of Christ and the invocation of the Holy Spirit, become Christ's Body and Blood
- CCC 1376 The Council of Trent summarizes the Catholic faith by declaring:
 "Because Christ our Redeemer said that it was truly his body that he was offering under

the species of bread, it has always been the conviction of the Church of God, and this holy Council now declares again, that by the consecration of the bread and wine there takes place a change of the whole substance of the bread into the substance of the body of Christ our Lord and of the whole substance of the wine into the substance of his blood. This change the holy Catholic Church has fittingly and properly called transubstantiation."

- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 883, p.270 If anyone denies that in the sacrament of the most holy Eucharist there are truly, really, and substantially contained the body and blood together with the soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, and therefore the whole Christ, but shall say that He is in it as by a sign or figure or force, let him be anathema.
 - It is not merely a remembrance of Jesus' sacrifice but an
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 888, p.271 If anyone says that in the holy sacrament of the Eucharist the only-begotten Son of God is not to be adored even outwardly with the worship of latria (the act of adoration), and therefore not to be venerated with a special festive celebration, nor to be borne about in procession according to the praiseworthy and universal rite and custom of the holy Church, or is not to be set before the people publicly to be adored, and that the adorers of it are idolators: let him be anathema.

- **Hebrews 7:27** ²⁷ He has no need, like those high priests, to offer sacrifices daily, first for his own sins and then for those of the people, since he did this once for all when he offered up himself.
- **Hebrews 9:12** ¹² he entered once for all into the holy places, not by means of the blood of goats and calves but by means of his own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption
- **Hebrews 9:26** ²⁶ for then he would have had to suffer repeatedly since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the ages to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself.
- Hebrews 10:10-14 ¹⁰ And by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. ¹¹ And every priest stands daily at his service, offering repeatedly the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins. ¹² But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, he sat down at the right hand of God, ¹³ waiting from that time until his enemies should be made a footstool for his feet. ¹⁴ For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified.

3. Confirmation

- CCC 1285 Baptism, the Eucharist, and the sacrament of Confirmation together
 constitute the "sacraments of Christian initiation," whose unity must be safeguarded. It
 must be explained to the faithful that the reception of the sacrament of Confirmation is
 necessary for the completion of baptismal grace.
- CCC 1300 The essential rite of the sacrament follows. In the Latin rite, "the sacrament of Confirmation is conferred through the anointing with chrism on the forehead, which is done by the laying on of the hand, and through the words: 'Accipe signaculum doni Spiritus Sancti' [Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit.]." In the Eastern Churches of Byzantine rite, after a prayer of epiclesis, the more significant parts of the body are anointed with myron: forehead, eyes, nose, ears, lips, chest, back, hands, and feet. Each anointing is accompanied by the formula Σφραγὶς δωρεᾶς Πνεύματος ἀγίου (Signaculum doni Spiritus Sancti): "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit." (699)
- CCC 1302 It is evident from its celebration that the effect of the sacrament of Confirmation is the special outpouring of the Holy Spirit as once granted to the apostles on the day of Pentecost
- **CCC 1288** "From that time on the apostles, in fulfillment of Christ's will, imparted to the newly baptized by the laying on of hands the gift of the Spirit that completes the grace of Baptism
- **CCC 1295** By this anointing the confirmand receives the "mark," the *seal* of the Holy Spirit
- **CCC 1296b** —This seal of the Holy Spirit marks our total belonging to Christ, our enrollment in his service for ever, as well as the promise of divine protection in the great eschatological trial. (1121)
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 871, p.265 If anyone shall say that the confirmation of those baptized is an empty ceremony and not rather a true and proper sacrament, or that in former times it was nothing more than a kind of catechism, by which those approaching adolescence gave an account of their faith before the Church: let him be anathema.

(Sacraments of Healing: Penance, Anointing the Sick)

4. Penance

- - CCC 1459 Many sins wrong our neighbor. One must do what is possible in order to repair the harm (e.g., return stolen goods, restore the reputation of someone slandered, pay compensation for injuries). Simple justice requires as much. But sin also injures and weakens the sinner himself, as well as his relationships with God and neighbor. Absolution takes away sin, but it does not remedy all the disorders sin has caused. Raised up from sin, the sinner must still recover his full spiritual health by doing something more to make amends for the sin: he must "make satisfaction for" or "expiate" his sins. This satisfaction is also called "penance." (2412; 2487; 1473)
 - **CCC 1440** Sin is before all else an offense against God, a rupture of communion with him. At the same time it damages communion with the Church. For this reason conversion entails both God's forgiveness and reconciliation with the Church, which are expressed and accomplished liturgically by the sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. (1850)
 - CCC 1456 Confession to a priest is an essential part of the sacrament of Penance:
 "All mortal sins of which penitents after a diligent self-examination are conscious must
 be recounted by them in confession, even if they are most secret and have been
 committed against the last two precepts of the Decalogue; for these sins sometimes
 wound the soul more grievously and are more dangerous than those which are
 committed openly." (1855; 1505)
 - **CCC 1457** According to the Church's command, "after having attained the age of discretion, each of the faithful is bound by an obligation faithfully to confess serious sins at least once a year."
 - CCC 1468 "The whole power of the sacrament of Penance consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship." Reconciliation with God is

thus the purpose and effect of this sacrament. For those who receive the sacrament of Penance with contrite heart and religious disposition, reconciliation "is usually followed by peace and serenity of conscience with strong spiritual consolation." Indeed the sacrament of Reconciliation with God brings about a true "spiritual resurrection," restoration of the dignity and blessings of the life of the children of God, of which the most precious is friendship with God. (2305)

Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 916, p.283 — If anyone denies
that sacramental confession was either instituted by divine law or is necessary for
salvation; or says that the manner of secretly confessing to a priest alone, which the
Catholic Church has always observed from the beginning and still observes, is alien to
the institution and the mandate of Christ, and is a human invention: let him be
anathema.

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•	Extreme Unction is when a sick or dying person is
	, strengthen their faith, ask for healing, and (if applicable) prepare for death

- **CCC 1519** The celebration of the sacrament includes the following principal elements: the "priests of the Church"—in silence—lay hands on the sick; they pray over them in the faith of the Church¹³⁴—this is the epiclesis proper to this sacrament; they then anoint them with oil blessed, if possible, by the bishop.
- **CCC 1511** The Church believes and confesses that among the seven sacraments there is one especially intended to strengthen those who are being tried by illness, the Anointing of the Sick: This sacred anointing of the sick was instituted by Christ our Lord as a true and proper sacrament of the New Testament. It is alluded to indeed by Mark,

but is recommended to the faithful and promulgated by James the apostle and brother of the Lord.

- CCC 1525 Thus, just as the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist form a unity called "the sacraments of Christian initiation," so too it can be said that Penance, the Anointing of the Sick and the Eucharist as viaticum constitute at the end of Christian life "the sacraments that prepare for our heavenly homeland" or the sacraments that complete the earthly pilgrimage. (1680; 2299)
- CCC 1532 The special grace of the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick has as its
 effects:
 - — the uniting of the sick person to the passion of Christ, for his own good and that of the whole Church;
 - — the strengthening, peace, and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age;
 - — the forgiveness of sins, if the sick person was not able to obtain it through the sacrament of Penance;
 - — the restoration of health, if it is conducive to the salvation of his soul;
 - — the preparation for passing over to eternal life.
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 927, p.285 If anyone says that the sacred anointing of the sick does not confer grace nor remit sins, nor alleviate the sick, but that it has already ceased, as if it had at one time only been a healing grace: let him be anathema.

This grace proper to the sacrament of Matrimony is intended to perfect the couple's love and to strengthen their indissoluble unity. By this grace they "help one another to attain holiness in their married life and in welcoming and educating their children."
- **CCC 1661** The sacrament of Matrimony signifies the union of Christ and the Church. It gives spouses the grace to love each other with the love with which Christ has loved his Church; the grace of the sacrament thus perfects the human love of the spouses, strengthens their indissoluble unity, and sanctifies them on the way to eternal life
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 980, p.297 If anyone says that the married state is to be preferred to the state of virginity or celibacy, and that it is not better and happier to remain in virginity and celibacy than to be united in matrimony: let him be anathema.

- CCC 1573 The essential rite of the sacrament of Holy Orders for all three degrees consists in the bishop's imposition of hands on the head of the ordinand and in the bishop's specific consecratory prayer asking God for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and his gifts proper to the ministry to which the candidate is being ordained. (699; 1585)
- **CCC 1582** As in the case of Baptism and Confirmation this share in Christ's office is granted once for all. The sacrament of Holy Orders, like the other two, confers an *indelible spiritual character* and cannot be repeated or conferred temporarily. (1121)
- **CCC 1556** To fulfil their exalted mission, "the apostles were endowed by Christ with a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit coming upon them, and by the imposition of hands they passed on to their auxiliaries the gift of the Spirit, which is transmitted down to our day through episcopal consecration.
- Council of Trent (Sources of Catholic Dogma) no. 964, p.295 If anyone says that by sacred ordination the Holy Spirit is not imparted, and that therefore the bishops say in vain: "Receive ye the Holy Spirit"; or that by it a character is not imprinted or that he who has once been a priest can again become a layman: let him be anathema.

 - 1 Timothy 3:1-13 The saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task. ² Therefore an overseer must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, sober-minded, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, ³ not a drunkard, not violent but gentle, not guarrelsome, not a lover of money. ⁴ He must manage his own household well, with all dignity keeping his children submissive, 5 for if someone does not know how to manage his own household, how will he care for God's church? ⁶ He must not be a recent convert, or he may become puffed up with conceit and fall into the condemnation of the devil. ⁷ Moreover, he must be well thought of by outsiders, so that he may not fall into disgrace, into a snare of the devil. 8 Deacons likewise must be dignified, not double-tongued, not addicted to much wine, not greedy for dishonest gain. 9 They must hold the mystery of the faith with a clear conscience. ¹⁰ And let them also be tested first; then let them serve as deacons if they prove themselves blameless. ¹¹ Their wives likewise must be dignified, not slanderers, but sober-minded, faithful in all things. 12 Let deacons each be the husband of one wife, managing their children and their own households well. ¹³ For those who serve well as deacons gain a good standing for themselves and also great confidence in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.
 - **Titus 1:5-9** ⁵ This is why I left you in Crete, so that you might put what remained into order, and appoint elders in every town as I directed you— ⁶ if anyone is above reproach, the husband of one wife, and his children are believers and not open to the charge of debauchery or insubordination. ⁷ For an overseer, as God's steward, must be above reproach. He must not be arrogant or quick-tempered or a drunkard or violent or greedy for gain, ⁸ but hospitable, a lover of good, self-controlled, upright, holy, and disciplined. ⁹ He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it.
